#### **PPOW** Collections

Can you believe that all the items collected for PPOW in 2022 added up to just over \$1000 in value? From sugar to shampoo, toothbrushes to toilet paper and a whole lot more, every item donated helps the PPOW budget and supplies our families with needed groceries. The Mission committee has honed our purchasing and donation requests to what our families
