


PPOW —October Collection


As always, thank you for your generous donations to PPOW every month. We couldn't do this program without you!

families over the past several distributions and they are all grateful for our support.






World Communion Sunday, October 2

On October 2 we will be receiving the Peace and Global Witness Offering. This offering draws Presbyterians together as active peacemakers and provides education and expose to those who show us how to do this work well. It allows us to create



resources for dealing with conflict and nurturing reconciliation and stand in support of our global sisters and brothers, because the peace of Christ belongs to people everywhere. By giving to the Peace and Global Witness offering, we work to share Christ's peace with one another. beyond our doors, beyond our communities and across boundaries.



25% of this offering is retained by our congregation to support peacemaking in our community, 25% is given to presbyteries and synods and 50% goes to the Presbyterian Mission Agency to advocate for peace and justice issues in cultures of violence, including our own. When we join with other congregations in supporting this offering we participate in peace efforts in the wider world. By retaining a portion of this offering, we also support our local community as we strive for peaceful solutions to local problems.

The Mission Committee at FPC decided this year to support the Open Doors for Refugees organization with the 25% of the offering that is for local peacemaking efforts.

Open Doors for Refugees is a non profit organization based in Madison. This all-volunteer ministry assists refugees in making a home by helping set up apartments with furnishings, providing translation, transportation, English as a Second Language classes, childcare and employment services for arriving refugees.



Open Doors works with refugees who have been selected by the UN refugee program and vetted by the US government. They come from many different countries and often wait many years to be able to come here.


- One-on-one grief support is available in-person, by phone or video chat.
