From the Associate Pastor for Pastoral Care



In the cherished and important moments of your life, which stories accompany you? Are they of family, pic-

tures to laugh and cry with, included? Are they from long-time employee-relationships at work, gathered over the years? Are they travels close-by or afar with friends? Perhaps they are in anticipation of sharing holiday (ie Christmas) greeting cards with updates of family/ friends you haven't seen in some time? ly cut or eliminated altogether.



PPOW (Presbyterian Pantry on Wheels)

Grocery distribution for the month of August served 12 families. The congregation provided produce from their gardens and families received tomatoes, potatoes, squash, celery, peppers, turnips, kale, green beans, jalapenos peppers, cucumbers, and watermelon. The PPOW families were grateful to have fresh produce to add to their homecooked meals! Thank you!

In addition to the fresh produce each family received: shredded cheese, chicken, ground beef, grapes, bananas, onions, eggs, bread, tortillas, carrots, peanut butter, oil, mayonnaise, ketchup, and cookies. Congregation donations from the monthly collections, also provided cereal and jelly. For many of the families, this will be the majority of the groceries for the month to feed their families.

A member of our congregation also gave each family a \$50 gift certificate to Walmart to help purchase school supplies. Thank you to our generous congregation

for adding additional items that the PPOW budget cannot provide! We are called to serve Jesus by contributing to the well -being of the most vulnerable in all societies. Your support of PPOW makes a difference in the lives of the families served.

As most of our families have children, we thought this would be a fun way to kick off the school year! As always, thanks for your ongoing support of the PPOW program!






"The Briarpatch Youth Shelter provides shelter and other services to homeless or runaway youth, or youth at risk of separation from their family due to conflict or other reasons. Opened in 2015, our shelter has eight beds and welcomes all youths, ages 12-17. There are an estimated 300 youth in Dane County who are homeless every night. This shelter was created to help these youth get off the streets and provide them with a safe place and services to succeed. Aside from providing shelter, we offer individual counseling, family counseling, case management and a 24-hour help line."


